1. The power or process of reproducing or recalling what has been learned and retained. 2. The store of things learned or retained.

1. It is important to purposely create good memories.

3. The stronger the connection with past knowledge, the greater the memory.

4. The more sense (touch, taste, etc.) is involved, the stronger the memory.

5. We have understanding when new information is connected to current knowledge - memory.

6. Rehearsal (re-hear) reinforces memory.

Good behavior is fertile ground for learning.

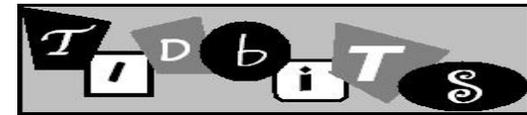
If we rehearse God’s Word in their ears, it will create memories that affects their lives.
